ROMEO AND JULIET AT THE GLOBE THEATRE ON THE 29 FEBRUARY


The English department took 50 students to watch Romeo and Juliet at the Globe theatre on 29 February.








We all met up for a dinner reservation at the Hard Rock Café followed by an evening at the Booth Theatre for a performance of 'Kimberly Akimbo'.



Ask your child to enter their username and password when prompted.

Most emails we send home are posted on our website, as well as updates, information, and announcements. New content is added to the website daily. To keep up with everything that is going on at Hartismere you can also follow us on Hartismere's official Facebook page and X.



BEGINNING AND END OF THE SCHOOL DAY

If parents are picking up and dropping off their children at school and in Eye, please could we ask that they are mindful of people in the local area? Local residents have experienced cars blocking driveways and other access points, including on the Castleton Grange estate. Please do park and drive with consideration for everyone in our community.

There is no permission for use of the hospital car park for drop-offs or pick-ups. Disabled parking spaces are, of course, for people with mobility difficulties. Thank you for your support.

The Local Authority is responsible for arrangements concerning school buses and this is managed through the service <u>SuffolkOnBoard</u>. It is recommended that, where possible, pupils and students walk or cycle to school.

Please remember that students should only travel on the bus to and from school that is clearly identified on their bus pass, otherwise they risk causing overcrowding and other safety problems.

Unfortunately the whistle blew and it wasn't in our favour and we lost by one goal. The U14's therefore came 3rd out of 12 schools and narrowly missed out on the finals by one goal. An outstanding achievement, well done! The U16's had a challenging day and they showed great perseverance and courage and developed as a team throughout the afternoon. The U18's showed outstanding play throughout all their games, moving ball-side and tipping the balls out of the air. They turned ball after ball and created skillful passages of play to goal. They were unbeaten all afternoon which means they are state school champions for 2024! Well done to all involved!

CERN TRIP

On 26 February an excited bunch of year 13 students embarked on the bi-annual Hartismere physics pilgrimage to Geneva in Switzerland to visit the home of particle physics, the large Hadron Collider at CERN. Due to phenomenal demand we were unable to secure our normal summer dates but the snow-capped mountains provided beautiful scenery and the lack of tourists made it far easier to get about the city by tram and bus. The group visited the ALICE (A Large Ion Collider Experiment) detector and the main control room for CERN, they learnt about the engineering and computing challenges at the forefront of scientific research and also how theoretical physics lights the way for the experimental physicists to design experiments in their quest for a grand unifying theory. Aside from physics the group visited the Red Cross Museum, learnt about the work of the UN, did their own particle accelerating at a bowling alley, enjoyed traditional Swiss fondue and completed science themed escape rooms (in French!). Overall a great trip to a fully international city that prides itself on political neutrality and cutting edge scientific research.













ECO TREE PLANTING

25 members of Eco Council along with Mrs Ballam, Mrs Stannard and Mr Jenner planted 50 trees at the end of the playing field on Tuesday 30 January. The trees have been planted to commemorate King Charles II's coronation last year.

The trees were donated to the school by Suffolk Tree Warden Network who give free trees to anyone who has a site with permission. Contact your local tree warden if you have a site and would like some free trees. We mulched the trees with Woodchip kindly donated by Nick Bobby, local tree surgeon.

We planted a mixture of Oak, Cherry, Crab Apple and Hornbeam, and used the theory that trees of the same species can communicate and look after one another through electrical signals that travel through the mycelium on their roots, therefore planting small groups of the same species next to each other.

The students worked very hard and really enjoyed themselves, even the litter pick that we did to tidy up the whole area afterwards!

SEVERE WEATHER

If there has been severe weather overnight a decision will be made by 7:45am whether the school is to close. You can find out if the school is closed by:

Checking the school website - www.hartismere.com
Receiving an SMS text alert (more info at www.hartismere.com/sms)
Telephoning (01379) 870315. A message stating that the school is closed will be heard before any further options.

Please note we will only post messages if the school is closed or partially closed. We will **not post any messages** if the **school is open**.

Occasionally a bus may be delayed, and this can happen for a variety of reasons. Pupils will know the approximate time when their bus usually arrives at the pick-up point. Sometimes it may take up to 30mins for the bus company to be notified of the delay and, if appropriate, arrange for a replacement bus and driver. The normal instruction to pupils therefore is to wait at the pick-up point for this length of time. However if there is bad weather it is a matter of judgement of pupils and parents whether this time is too long. Clearly in very cold, snowy conditions children should not be waiting this length of time.

Parents should discuss this with their son or daughter and make arrangements so they know what to do if they have to return home when a bus fails to appear, particularly in severe conditions or if the school has to close early during the school day. It is important to make sure they have a house key or there is a relative or neighbour they can go to if parents are out at work.

In the unlikely event that the weather deteriorates **during the day** and would make the journey home from school hazardous, then school buses may be called early. We suggest that parents, particularly those who are likely to be at work, discuss the matter carefully with their son or daughter and have a plan in place so that pupils can return safely home, or to a near neighbour, until parents arrive home.

Visits to school & dropping things off...

If you are dropping something off for your child such as dinner money, forgotten PE kit, packed lunch or homework for example, please take it to Mrs Lawrence in the Pupil Services Office. This is located just inside the entrance to the Sports Hall. Please remind your child that they should go there to collect it. If they do not know that you are bringing something in we will attempt to get a message to them.

If you are coming into the school for any other reason such as a meeting with a member of staff, please remember to report to Reception and sign in.
